In the Old Testament, Jehovah, reminds us(who are His by Covenant),to set aside a portion of our harvest, for strangers in the land. Time to pause and ponder. We were 'strangers' in a foreign land at one time and our 'hosts' heeded God's commandment. Thus, this land, a second home to (David's) stars and by His only son's stripes, is blessed repeatedly for being mindful of strangers - immigrants legal and illegal, refugees, visitors, tourists, merchants, diplomats and of course the vagrant deviants. The God of Ancient Times remembers to bless those who remember and honor His Word.

Many of us accept that the generosity of our hosts has much to do with our status and prosperity. Some do not (and quite emphatically). Indeed, they may argue that their prayers have helped sustain this land. But like the gardener who beseeched his master to spare a barren tree - there is a peculiar gift we can bring as hope to a 'failing', fearful generation. The gardener was willing to get his hands dirty with manure to bring fertility back to a barren tree. Can we likewise, volunteer to save a generation, threatened by a divine hand of correction? How can we demonstrate our appreciation for their setting aside

a handful or two or more of 'grain' for us to gather?

There is much that we can "Give" rather than "Receive". For instance, many of us are into Technology. Compared with the percentage of Asian Indian Christians excelling at Technology, hundreds of our 'Hosts' are unable to acquire basic, required tools for employment or advancement. If we sift through the layers of disbelief and denial, we realize that these tools are too expensive for the average 'host' to acquire. Technical Schools, Colleges and even Trade Schools charge exorbitant rates for training. Many of us think nothing of strolling into Retail Stores and purchasing PCs, Laptops and latest software. Whereas, many average families are unable to budget even for necessities, have defaulted on loans and are living with parents and in-laws. Some share living quarters with limited access to facilities.

The recent RNC and DNC events shed some light on this sad reality. Hopelessness and anger have seeped into the framework of our society. Outrageous claims and accusations rule our way of life. As the frustrations increase, growing numbers are tempted to believe that they must also

'participate' in demonstrations and express their anger. When they win media attention, they are motivated to clamor for even more. Voices of reason are drowned. Elderly leaders come out of closets and warn of dire happenings. They warn the very wealthy, to heed the Word, to set aside a portion of their harvest for God and a 'handful'(or two or three)for the strangers in the land. But in response, only mocking, angry words rise up to burn their ears. Have the hecklers not heard the "earthly story with a divine meaning" - a rich man who denied Lazarus the beggar, crumbs from his sumptuous table? But when Hell claimed the rich man's soul, he opened his eyes and begged Abraham, to make Lazarus, dip the tip of his finger in water and cool his tongue! In this our present society of 'stiffnecked' deniers, is there an opportunity for Asian Indian Christian groups, to offer their services for little or no fees? Can they bring training within the reach of the disenfranchised, the forgotten neighbor? Rather than expect the unfortunate to depend on public funds and agencies to shoulder this real problem, can we pitch in and organize? It is a great opportunity to emulate the gardener who pleaded with his Master, not to raise His Hand against a failed purpose in life.

When I have decided to join the Junior Bible Quiz competition, I started to hear it improves my knowledge of God's words, Creates confidence, helps me work as a team and get me involve more into the Word of God. There are many challenges I came to know after preparing and practice with the JBQ study guide. Can you beat the Buzzer ?, Compete with new friends, Who can answer the question faster? I have decided to come up with the right plan for my preparation.

When I am studying JBQ, I usually split or divide, the number of questions for each day. For example, I have thirty ten point questions to go for the week. I would do five questions a day since 30 /5 = 6, so I could finish one day earlier learned to practice, Once the questions, I would keep on reciting them until I got them correct. Then, I would go up to my mom. My mom would underline or circle the parts I missed so the next time I would focus on that mistakes, and correct that error. The weeks of prayer and preparation finally led us up to the actual day of VBS on July 14th. The theme verse for VBS was "God is with me and will watch over me wherever I go" Genesis 28:15. GRAVITATIONAL WAVES (continuation from July article...)

In Pennsylvania tried to measure any change in size of the bar. There was no positive result.

Interferometer Gravitational-wave Observatory), one in Livingston, Louisiana and the other one at Han ford, Washington. A laser beam was made to split and move over two perpendicular paths each 2.4 miles long. At the end of these paths, the beam was reflected back and combined at the origin. This cancels out each other. In LIGO when a gravitational wave passes through; one arm get stretched and the other gets squeezed. Since the two beams have to travel different lengths, an interference pattern is created, and this could be measured.

1.3 billion years ago two black locations of measurement, holes, one 36 and the other 29times the mass of our sun collided. This increased the mass of black holes by 62 solar masses. The balance 3 solar

It was calculated that the collision Next came LIGO(the Laser happened at a distance of 1.3 billion light years.(Approximately, this distance in miles = 1,300,000,000 years, X 365 days. X 24 hours, X 60 minutes, X 60 seconds, X 186,000 miles second per 762,540,480,000,000,000,000miles) The wave was strong enough to be detected by LIGO during the last second of collision when it reached the earth. LIGO at Louisiana detected the wave first and was detected at LIGO Washington after seven-thousandths of a second because of the distance between the two observatories.

> Since there are only two the actual source where the collision happened could not be accurately extrapolated. In the future a few more sensitive instruments will be

coming up on line. A third LIGO will come up in India in a few years. Then we will be able to pinpoint the source of collision more narrowly.

The vastness of the universe is mind boggling, and cannot be comprehended by human mind. The distance from earth to the place where the black holes collided is a minuscule part of the known universe. It goes without saying how great is its creator who made His Son to suffer and die for saving our souls. He treats our souls much more precious than his other vast creations.

All BECAUSE HE LOVED US - WE INSIGNIFICANT CREATURES compared to the vastness of the universe (Even our Solar System is nothing compared to the size of the known universe) !!!.

Praise be to God. Let us remind ourselves to be humble and be thankful to Him.


