Let's Talk About GRACE

While going on my regular walk this morning, I was reminded to write about grace as we embark on another new academic year with new day care, new school and probably, a new place of work. But, why grace? When we talk about grace, we often refer to the redeeming aspect of grace. That's what the hymn writer says:

"Amazing grace how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost but now I'm found. Was blind but now I see."

The famous John Wesley mentions this as the prevenient grace; the grace of God that will not let us go. It is the grace of God that was with us even before we became aware of it. It is the grace of God that relentlessly pursues us in order to redeem us from the ways of the world.

However, I am interested in this

aspect of grace that is beyond the redemption of our hearts and souls. The one that got my attention and the one that God laid on my heart to write is this - the sustaining nature of grace. Look again, this is what the hymn writer says:

"tis grace that brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead us home."

The summer went by very quickly and we enjoyed our time as a family; many things could have gone wrong but by His grace we were sustained. We embarked on a mission trip with the teens and so many things could have gone wrong but it is the grace of God that sustained us thru and thru. We could not have done this without the grace of God sustaining us.

I know a friend who has to do regular exercise to keep his blood pressure down but is unable to because of his arthritis in the knee. This morning as I went for a walk God was reminding me of the grace that is given to me to keep up my regular exercise schedule. I hardly thank God for His unceasing grace in my life. Sometimes the small trials of life seem to overwhelm us and we do not get to see the big picture where God is in control and doing amazing things in and

through us.

Finally, this grace of God is also a sanctifying one. We, who have been redeemed by grace tend to make light of this by continuing to live a life that is not pleasing to God. As Bonheoffer says, "grace is free but it is not cheap." The grace of God that redeems us is also interested in sanctifying our lives to the fullest until we become like the Son. The reason for our sanctification is that we might show the love of Christ to the world through our words and deeds. It is not enough to be redeemed but it must be lived out in our daily lives.

Let me close with the words of the Apostle Paul in Colossians 4:6: "Let your speech always be with grace, as though seasoned with salt, so that you will know how you should respond to each person (NASB)." As we begin another new academic year, may we be reminded to thank God for His sustaining grace but importantly, allow most sanctifying nature of this grace to do its work in our lives so that, "others may see the good works and give thanks to our Father in heaven."

Let grace abound...

"Strangers in the Land" (continued from August Issue) - Reggie Rao

As we all know, the Bible is the world's greatest treasure of poetic expression and Truth. In a particularly poignant and poetic moment, in the Old Testament, Jehovah illustrates the importance of setting aside a portion of our harvest for strangers in the land.

As the story unfolds, we begin to understand the complexity of Divine Will and Purpose. We see a picture of Ruth, a young, forlorn widow, standing before some barley fields in Bethlehem. It is the beginning of harvest time.

Ruth is a stranger from Moab, a land despised for its incestuous infamy. She has of her own free will chosen to accompany her mother-in-law Naomi, as she returns to Bethlehem, after losing her husband and both sons. Ruth had been married to Naomi's younger son. This was a dangerous journey for two lonely widows to even attempt. Evil, violent, desperate robbers and scoundrels frequented the roads linking villages, towns and cities.

But then, Jehovah, the origin of Love heard and Mercy, had Ruth's heartbroken sobs Naomi's on shoulder. And He had noted Ruth's refusal to leave her mother-in-law's company, even as Naomi bitterly rejected her heart-rending pleas to stay. He had heard with great satisfaction to Ruth's thrilling statement of steadfast sacrifice and love, to her mother-in-law:

"Intreat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge; thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God".

(KJV).

This statement of undivided love, allegiance to the memory of her late husband, unshakeable faith in her mother-in-law, wins Ruth, a coveted crown -a major branch in the tree of His only Son's lineage.

We hold our breath meanwhile, for that complexity of Divine Will and Purpose to unfold. Jehovah has set His mark on the forehead of a despised Gentile, born low but in her loss and steadfast love, lifted high above the clouds.

A little later, we have a touching picture of Boaz, painted by the same Divine Artist, the God of Dreams. The Master Creator chooses many varieties of brushes. They vary from the silkiest sable to the roughest camel. Words in brilliant pastels, sober brown and black fill his canvas. He has the power to roll up the canvas and the very heavens if it is His Will. But it is not time yet for that.

Boaz, a kinsman of Naomi, with the quick eye of a landlord and employer, spots forlorn Ruth. He feels immediate compassion for the stranger in the land. He remembers the commandment and deals with the stranger, in obedience to God's Word. He has chosen well – a stranger favored by the God of Ancient Times.

AICC Teens Mission Trip - Divya Pakianathan

Six girls, Six boys, three adults, and one professional weed wacker embarked to West Virginia in a rented van and a Toyota Highlander this August. With experience, and for many, suitcases packed with untouched equipment and work boots, the prospects of the trip seemed uncertain. After all, even with the best of intentions, how much work could a group of teenagers really accomplish in one week? Arriving in West Virginia, it was clear we weren't in New Jersey anymore. Coming from one of the most ethnically diverse states in the country, we had arrived in a state with a population that is 95% white. It was also a town where cellular data access could only be found on a singular stretch of road for about ten minutes, and the only place with WiFi was the local Dairy Queen. Even our evening devotion sessions were radically different — with the songs featuring way more banjos and country roads than we were accustomed to in our usual worship. In short, we were far out of our comfort zones. Yet, in the short week we spent in Appalachia, we adapted. For some of us, it was the first time mopping bathrooms or cleaning dishes. Without internet, we spent the week clueless about the latest news or developments in the election. However, all of the new environment changes in our enabled focus. without us to

distractions, on the task at hand — the home.

Every morning, before loading up the van to the worksite, we made our own ham and cheese or PB&J sandwiches to go. We packed up the tools, loaded our self-cleaned paint brushes, and after my Thatha took several photos, we were ready to leave. With the help of ASP volunteers Mike and Keith, we took on different responsibilities as we sought to transform Happy's home. Some of us took on the job of completely remodeling the back of the house, even removing an entire section. Others learned how to fill concrete for the first time, building a pathway for Happy to walk on comfortably. Several took on the task of priming and painting the exterior of the house blue. We had certain individual responsibilities as well, with my Thatha earning himself the nickname, "Joe the weed wacker" successfully after

purposefully ridding the home of weeds. We even had our own resident "wasp patrol", ready to quickly inform the rest of us of incoming threats, as well as a team of people trying to catch a cat attempting to make its way into the home. Perhaps the most important job, however, was getting to know the homeowner, Happy. It's easy to separate the house and the work from the actual human being who there. However, several lives members of our team worked to establish meaningful and personal relationships with Happy and her puppy Humini, forming connections likely to last longer than the house itself.

It's true that the remnants of primer and fluorescent blue paint will soon fade from our hair, jeans, and work boots, and while the newly furnished exterior of home may eventually crack and the weeds will grow back, what will not change is a home and a life transformed by Christ.
